

#### **GROWING TOGETHER**


Growing food on-site year round hydroponically increases food access to the community, connects urban families to the food life cycle, and supports our nutrition education programs. Cooking, growing, and eating together builds community connections and fosters health & wellness. In 2022 we discovered our gardens were extremely popular with college interns and service learners. They found some peace in their busy school year by coming in a few hours each week and tending to the indoor and outdoor gardens. Most described it as meditative and the most restorative time during their week. We agree, gardens can be healing and we're grateful to share ours with the wider community.

Our outdoor Peace Garden became a beautiful shared space that guests and neighbors took time to enjoy all summer and fall. It also became the focal point for our children's garden party and summer block party series!

#### 2022 Highlights

- Successfully integrated native planting techniques by growing a Three Sisters garden of beans, squash, and corn.
- Hosted 2 community seed giveaways. Community members received vegetable plant seedlings grown in our hydroponic room to plant at home.
- Organized a children's garden party in our community garden, where we created art, planted seeds, distributed books, and tasted garden-grown produce.
- Worked with a team from UWM to build two on-site insulated composting systems.

#### **FOOD EDUCATION**

Each week at our Despensa de la Paz Community Food Center we prepare a healthy, simple food sample made with ingredients found on the shelves at our pantry. We worked hard to develop in-house recipes intentionally designed to highlight unique pantry finds that might be unfamiliar to shoppers. Recipes were provided in both English and Spanish to allow for greater reach. With the help of a creative dietetics intern we were able to expand our food samples to our Zion Rock pantry during her time with us. In September we had a second dietetics intern for the year who created a set of take-home information cards on the fresh produce we were offering each week. The cards included safe handling instructions, preparation ideas, and nutritional facts. Digital copies of the cards were made accessible by a QR Code as well.

Into the future, we are hoping to roll out robust programming at all of our sites, so that patrons from all the neighborhoods we serve have access to this resource. Through partnerships with dietetic interns at local colleges we're developing food demonstrations to build on the great work we did in 2022.

#### 2022 Highlights:

- Over 2,500 food samples were provided to guests at our pantries.

#### **HOME DELIVERY**

Friedens serves homebound individuals and families across Milwaukee who are food insecure but experience barriers to accessing free groceries from a food center location. Friedens customizes box content to meet different dietary needs and partners with DoorDash to optimize the delivery of hundreds of boxes a month.

Delivering fresh, healthy, culturally-specific foods in a dignified and innovate way improves health outcomes for disabled and homebound individuals. This optimized strategy for delivering food is both cost-effective and highly customized to meet the age and diet-specific needs of clients.

- Added new delivery sites to specifically reach low-income senior buildings and refugee sites
- Increased the % of fresh produce being delivered
- Conducted a needs assessment with support from MCW and implemented participant feedback
- Added recipes to the boxes to help participants know what to prepare with their box

#### **VOLUNTEERS**

Over the course of 2022, Friedens saw an increase from approximately 820 volunteers serving our locations to over 1,400. The COVID-19 pandemic instituted new and unique challenges, but with the help of our volunteers, Friedens was able to handle these in stride. During 2022, Friedens was able to reopen the inside of our pantries and begin serving the community within our buildings. Our volunteers served a combined total of 16,221+ hours, representing \$485,819+ in added value to Friedens. As 2022 was the first year that Friedens began running the annual Empty Bowls event, we welcomed new volunteers with new skills to our amazing team. Our talented volunteers helped us with a plethora of projects, including creating graphics, painting and creating ceramic bowls, updating our website, and more.

#### **PARTNERSHIP SPOTLIGHTS & WIDER REACH**

- Hosted 3 summer block parties in partnership with Muskego Way Forward with bounce houses, resource tables, and grilled over 500 burgers and brats!
- Brought in Dietetic students and interns from Mount Mary and MATC to connect with community members for a deeper understanding of community nutrition needs.
- Hosted the League of Women Voters who helped with voter registration and updating voter information.
- Nurses from Froedtert and Ascension provided flu shots, blood pressure screenings, and blood glucose testing throughout the year.
- Provided nutrition resources and kitchen tools for clients alongside 16th Street Clinic.
- Hosted Mount Mary Art Therapy Students to create community art projects.
- Conducted FoodShare (food stamps) outreach with the help of Feeding America and Hunger Task Force.
