

Our outdoor Peace Garden has become a beautiful shared space that guests and neighbors took time to enjoy all summer and fall. Our indoor hydroponic towers grew flavorful herbs and vegetables and were managed by volunteers led by our AmeriCorps member.

2023 Highlights

- Hosted multiple community seed giveaways. Community members received vegetable plant seedlings grown in our hydroponic room to plant at home.
- Pollinator education at block party through Zoological Society of Milwaukee
- Started composting in our new compost bin designed by UWM students and faculty.



FRIEDENS EMPTY BOWLS

In 2023, Friedens hosted it's second Empty Bowls fundraiser. This long-standing event brings together local restaurants and artisans to raise money to address hunger in our community. We took on the Kern Center and filled it with a thousand people! We enjoyed live music, good soups and breads, and raised money to support our network of food centers.

FRIEDENS SUMMER BLOCK PARTIES

During the summer months of June, July, and August, Friedens celebrated a series of community block parties. We brought in resources requested by community members, created art, danced, and grilled burgers and hot dogs. Amazing volunteers brought side dishes and helped cook! Enjoying being together and building relationships amongst neighbors is what we do. In 2023 interactive art projects were led by a local chalk artist who taught kids and adults how to create awesome drawings from basic shapes. We were also joined this year by the UWM Story Cart where community stories were collected and shared.

FOOD, WELL-BEING & SUSTAINABILITY

At Friedens we recognize the importance of the food lifecycle from seed to compost. From the seedlings we plant together in the spring to the food that we compost and everything in between, we recognize opportunities for connection in every aspect of the food lifecycle.lifecycle from seed to compost.

Our food demo table is managed each year by an AmeriCorps member and each person has put their unique stamp on community conversations around nourishment.

2023 Highlights:

- Hundreds of **seedlings** were donated to share with our community.
- Over **2,500** food samples were tasted by our guests.
- Nearly **300,000 pounds** of food was recovered from local grocers and diverted from a landfill. This food is sorted for quality by passionate volunteers who recognize the importance of putting the freshest items on our shelves.
- Food from our **Food Rescue program** is made possible, in part, by valuable partners such as Outpost, Trader Joe's, and Costco. Nearly a third of the food on our shelves is through this program and allows greater choice for our guests.
- Our first 256 gallon composting cube has been filled with food waste! More to come in 2024!
- Worked with a volunteer student to collect and evaluate data on our composting program.











HOME DELIVERY

Friedens serves homebound individuals and families across Milwaukee who are food insecure but experience barriers to accessing free groceries from a food center location. Friedens customizes box content to meet different dietary needs and partners with DoorDash to optimize the delivery of hundreds of boxes a month.

Delivering fresh, healthy, culturally-specific foods in a dignified and innovate way improves health outcomes for disabled and homebound individuals. This optimized strategy for delivering food is both cost-effective and highly customized to meet the mobility and diet-specific needs of clients.

As the program has grown over the past two years, we quickly found there was a very high demand for these services. The organization made the decision to hire a part-time Home Delivery Coordinator to help streamline these services and hopefully enroll more qualified individuals in the future. Next year, we hope to continue building out this program and be able to center equity in our food distribution model.

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers are an integral part of how we were able to serve 54,000 people with over 1 million pounds of food in 2023. Our Volunteer Community grew to over 2,100 members—a 55% increase from the year before. Volunteers have transformative experiences when paired with community shoppers to provide a welcoming environment, a smiling face, and friendly service as shoppers navigated the pantry shelves. Then, when pandemic-era food benefits ended in April and we saw a huge spike in visits to our community food centers, volunteers rose up to meet the challenge. We enjoyed volunteer support at every level of our organization in 2023, with nearly 100% attendance at Board meetings, volunteers supporting social media, graphic design, events, and marketing. Our gratitude could not be greater!

PARTNERSHIP SPOTLIGHTS & WIDER REACH

- Hosted 3 summer block parties in partnership with Muskego Way Forward with bounce houses, resource tables, and grilled hundreds burgers and brats!
- Brought in Dietetic students and interns from Mount Mary and MATC to connect with community members for a deeper understanding of community nutrition needs.
- Hosted the League of Women Voters who helped with voter registration and updating voter information.
- Nurses from Froedtert and Ascension provided flu shots, blood pressure screenings, and blood glucose testing throughout the year. We also hosted the Ascension Mammogram Van twice and filled every appointment slot.
- Held a health fair featuring providers from Froedtert, Children's Hospital, and MCW.
- Conducted FoodShare (food stamps) outreach with the help of Feeding America and Hunger Task Force.
- Piloted a program with the Saturday Clinic for the Uninsured providing on-site groceries to patients who screen positive for food insecurity.
- Installed Nalox-Zone Harm Reduction boxes for community Narcan Distribution through UW-Madison School of Medicine and Public Health
